The college has an Academic Committee, which sits periodically on the issues related to curriculum and within its limited scopes takes initiative in this respect in the following ways:

As a result, 02 faculty members were awarded PhD, 01 other faculty member is doing PhD, 01 orientation programme and 01 in UGC Short Term Course participated. No. of publication increased. Two books with ISBN, 04 without ISBN, 16 papers in National and International journals were published. Participation in National/ International Seminars also increased. 08 in international, 17 in national Seminars participated with papers.

Initiative was also taken to promote research culture among students. The students of 06 departments carried out project work and of 04 departments carried out dissertation work. 03 Institutional level seminars and 32 departmental seminars were held.

280 students undertook field-based study on environmental issues. Besides, 31 students undertook education tour to Darjeeling.

6.3.5 Library, ICT and physical infrastructure / instrumentation

6.3.6 Human Resource Management

Coaching class on reasoning and general awareness was conducted for empowerment of students to appear in competitive examinations.

Part-time teachers are recruited as and when necessary. This year part-time teacher were recruited in the department of Political science, Economics, Education, Philosophy, Arabic, Hindi, Assamese and Anthropology

**ANALYSIS OF STUDENTS' FEEDBACK: A SUMMARY
YEAR: 2014-15**

Feedback from students and alumni is taken for the session 2014-15 to improve the teaching-learning process of the institute. In this regard, the present student feedback system adopts randomized sampling method, where 150 undergraduate level students and 40 alumni have been interviewed. As a tool of investigation, closed ended questionnaire is constructed using LIKERT scale method. The questionnaire for students basically encompasses five broad areas, e.g., assessment of teacher, assessment of administration, assessment of support system, assessment of library and assessment of basic requirements. In the similar manner, the questionnaire developed for alumni encompasses areas like overall development of college, student-teacher relation, cooperation to students, etc.

Key Highlights:

- ✓ The feedback reflects that teachers must give due importance on the areas of latest development in the subject, supply of relevant study materials, etc.
- ✓ The feedback suggests that the college office needs to be more cooperative with students to their needs.
- ✓ The library should procure sufficient books to accommodate students.
- ✓ Alumni feel that overall development of the college is satisfactory, but needs more attention in the areas like placement and support system to make the institute a centre of excellence.

The feedback is analysed and discussed in the general meeting, where measures are identified and suggested for necessary implementation.

BEST PRACTICES

Best practice – 1

1. Title of the Practice

Clean and Pollution Free Campus

2. Goal

The practice targets to inculcate the value of cleanliness in the mind of student community to make the campus clean and pollution free. Since, students are the responsible stakeholders of the society; such a practice at institution level can cultivate better habit among the students for a clean and green society.

3. The Context

In the wake of global environmental degradation, the policymakers and environmentalists exert on the concept of sustainable development. In the broader periphery of sustainable development, protecting environment from further degradation is the basic goal.

4. The Practice

With an aim to create awareness about clean and green environment among the students, the college authority aims to organize programmes where emphasis is laid on full participation on the part of the students. The best time for the awareness programmes is the occasions like World Environment Day, Freshman Social, College Week, Independence Day, Republic Day, etc. Therefore, the authority looks forward to observe the occasions with a day long programme where speeches on cleanliness, green environment and sustainable development are delivered by the internal resource persons. Students are divided into groups and various tasks are assigned.

5. Evidence of Success

World Environmental Day was observed with the rest of the world putting emphasis on clean and green environment. On the occasion, not only the college campus was cleaned but also saplings were planted. Awareness programmes were also organised on the occasion of Independence Day. Speeches on cleanliness and green campus were delivered and students were divided into groups and assigned with various tasks.

6. Problems Encountered and Resources Required

The smooth functioning of the practice is constrained by a number of problems, some of which are worth mentioning below:

- Paucity of fund is the recurrent problem for smooth conduction of the programme. The organization of the programmes is mainly funded from college fund, which is raised through students' fees.
- Introduction of semester system has limited the scope for students and teachers due to tight academic schedule.

In view of the above problems the following resource are required:

- a) The budgeted required amount for the programmes should be externally funded.

b) The physical infrastructure in terms of classroom should better develop to accommodate the classes, which are foregone in the name of the programmes.

- provide Book Bank facility to poor and meritorious students

5. Evidences of Success

The college is now a home to students of diverse cultures and has managed to reach out to students belonging to BPL families, SC/ ST and Minority communities and remote areas. The introduction of remedial classes, special classes, inter-departmental classes, tests and ICT have indeed improved the quality of education as a whole. The pass percentage of students has increased to a great extent. The enrolment of girl students has also increased. Some students belonging to poor families were provided with Book Bank facility and this has indeed boosted their zeal to excel in education. As a result of the practice of Effective Teaching Learning process, the literacy rate of the rural surrounding of the college has improved. This shows that the college has undeniably contributed to the socio-economic and academic development of the surrounding rural areas.

6. Problems Encountered and Resources Required

The institute suffers from dearth of fund regarding fuller provision of some of the ICT applications in classroom teaching. Although UGC has extended their help, it is not sufficient enough to convert the practice in its ultimate realization. Moreover, the institute is deficient in terms of state-of-the art laboratories for the departments with such requirements.
